



Echadi Nation Republic Nationality Study Guide

The Echadi Nation Republic is a sovereign Indigenous government established to restore and preserve the divine identity and rights of our people. We are a constitutional nation built upon the covenant of our ancestors, guided by spiritual law, and aligned with international law protecting Indigenous peoples. As written on our official site, “The Echadi Nation Republic is a sovereign Indigenous government established to restore and preserve the divine identity and rights of our people. Our sacred motto(s), “Rise Up and The Spirit of the Land Walks With Us,” captures the essence of who we are. Nationals are bound by the Constitution, which sets out governance, laws, and the obligations of each member of the Nation. The Chief, our head of state, is governed under Unit 3 and Unit 7 of the Constitution, ensuring balance between authority and accountability. The Supremacy Clause and Covenant of the National Community, found in Unit 13, bind us together in unity and lawful duty. No private membership association or individual within our jurisdiction is subject to U.S. state courts, for disputes are governed exclusively under the ENR Jural Society. This is part of the sovereignty that distinguishes ENR as a Nation.

The Ministry of Economics and Engineering is entrusted with the Treasury, protecting our economy through Indigenous control and design. Through this, we affirm the truth that sovereignty is inseparable from finance.

Becoming part of ENR begins with Nationalization, the sacred process by which an individual affirms their Indigenous identity, bloodline, and allegiance to the Constitution of the Echadi Nation Republic. Unlike U.S. “naturalization,” which is statutory, ENR Nationalization is spiritual and lawful, tied to covenant. It is governed by

Unit 12, which contains the Affirmation of Office, and Unit 13, which contains the Covenant of the National Community. In this process, one declares domicile their permanent legal home under the jurisdiction of ENR, distinct from any state or federal domicile. To remain in good standing, every National must honor the National Dues Act, which makes monthly contributions mandatory as a covenantal duty rather than an optional donation.

Nationalization is sealed by the Affirmation of Oath (Office), where the National declares loyalty, responsibility, and sacred duty to the Nation. This is the act that binds the individual to ENR law and government.

Our sovereignty extends onto the land and into travel. The Department of Travel (DOT) governs the right of Nationals to move freely. Within ENR, we do not use the foreign concept of “vehicles”; instead, our conveyances are called Private Land Vessels. Nationals are issued a Tribal Travelers License rather than a driver’s license. Unlike the state systems, ENR Nationals are not compelled to use state-issued license plates, for travel within our jurisdiction is protected under ENR law. Each National receives a unique 7-digit Tribal Travelers License number, issued through the Tribal DOT Registry, which records lawful recognition of their travel rights.

Our land policies reflect our commitment to permanence and responsibility. ENR land is leased under 99-year terms, with the option to renew for another 99 years. This ensures stability across generations while preserving collective sovereignty.

The Echadi Nation Republic is not isolated from the global community. Our sovereignty is affirmed through international law, most notably the Montevideo Convention of 1933, which outlines the four qualifications of statehood: a permanent population, a defined territory, a government, and the capacity to enter into relations with other states. ENR fulfills each of these qualifications, making our status as a Nation lawful and recognized.

Further, the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) guarantees our right to self-determination, self-government, and autonomy. Article 4 specifically ensures the right of Indigenous peoples to autonomy in internal and local affairs. These international instruments confirm that our Nation stands within global law and order, not outside of it.

Commerce within the Echadi Nation Republic is regulated through tribal mechanisms rather than state or federal systems. Every business must register with the Nation and obtain a TEIN (Tribal Entity Identification Number). This process, called Business Registration, affirms that all enterprises operate under tribal law, preserving sovereignty in economics. The Echadi Council of Jurists, operating under the Ministry of Justice, issues charters for Tribal Jurists, providing lawful recognition and authority.

Our economy is empowered by the Echadi Dollar (ECD) and the Echadi Token, both serving as mediums of exchange that strengthen our financial independence from external control. Constitutional revisions, should they ever be necessary, are governed by Unit 11 of the Constitution.

Finally, the Affirmation of Office, found in Unit 12, is the binding declaration by which officials and Nationals alike pledge loyalty, duty, and responsibility to the Nation. It is more than an oath it is a covenantal alignment with our ancestors and our laws, affirming that the governance of the Nation flows from the people through sacred promise.

The Echadi Nation Republic is more than a political entity; it is a spiritual Nation grounded in covenant, law, and land. To be a National is to be bound by responsibility and by privilege to live under our Constitution, contribute to our Treasury, travel under our DOT, and honor our sovereignty under international law.

By learning the answers not as trivia, but as flowing truths about who we are, every National is equipped not just to pass a test, but to embody the covenant and responsibility of the Echadi Nation Republic.
